




From the Administration

HUGE News!

In September, students at Leicester Public Schools will have expanded science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) learning opportunities thanks to \$63,000 in grant funds that the district was awarded this week.

The Leicester Middle School was awarded a \$28,000 expansion grant from Project Lead the Way (PLTW) in partnership with the Mass STEM Hub. PLTW is a nonprofit organization that designs engaging courses that incorporate STEM through real world challenges. Currently, the middle school offers a PLTW Design and Modeling course which teaches students in grades 6, 7, and 8 about the engineering design process. The school will continue to teach this course




to incoming sixth graders in September, while adding Automation and Robotics for its seventh and eighth graders. The school will be able to use these funds to cover the costs of the durable equipment needed get this new course up and running. During the 2018-2019 school year, the

middle school intends to add a third course, Flight and Space, enabling all middle school students to have a trimester of three STEM courses before going on to high school.

In addition, Leicester High School was awarded \$35,000 from a PLTW grant in partnership with the Commonwealth of Massachusetts through its STEM Advisory Council and Workforce Skills Cabinet. These funds will allow the high school to begin offering engineering courses to its students.

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The first course to be rolled in will be Introduction to Engineering Design in which students deepen their understanding of the engineering design process. They will apply math, science, and engineering standards to hands-on projects. The second course to be rolled




in will be Principles of Engineering where students explore a variety of engineering topics including mechanisms, strength of structure and materials, and automation, and then they apply what they know to take on design challenges.

Assessment



In February, Leicester Middle School was chosen to participate in the NAEP assessment process. The NAEP assessment is sometimes referred to as the Nation's Report Card.

Per NAEP guidelines, sixty eighth grade students were randomly selected to take these assessments. The school was instructed to prepare appropriately for English language learners and students with disabilities. Parents of students selected to participate in these assessments were notified in writing prior to the administration of the tests. The tests covered math and English and were taken on Surface Pro tablets. Students got to keep the earbuds that were provided for the assessments.

The site coordinator from NAEP wrote to Ms. Nelson after the tests were completed to report that our students were cooperative, well behaved, and polite, and they took the tests very seriously.





Curriculum Corner

In April and May, students in grades 3-8 will be taking MCAS 2.0 tests in English Language Arts (ELA) and mathematics. The original version of MCAS, the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System, has been administered since 1998.

In 2011 new standards were adopted and Massachusetts joined the Partnership for Advancement of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) to develop new assessments to match these new standards. Grades 3-8 students in Leicester took these new PARCC assessments in the spring of 2015 and 2016. Last year, the Massachusetts Board of Elementary and Secondary Education voted to develop next-generation MCAS rather than continue with the PARCC assessments. This new MCAS 2.0 will be used to assess grades 3-8 students in ELA and mathematics over the next couple of months. Students in Leicester will take these tests on a Chromebook as they have for the past few years. Although the test has a new name, it will be very familiar to our students in grades 4-8 who have taken similar tests in previous years.

These tests are given to our students as a result of the 1993 education reform law which directed the Board to create a statewide assessment program. Why and how we administer state assessments to our students continues to be a topic of discussion nationwide. As Commissioner Chester states, "It is entirely appropriate for us to examine the content and methods of assessment, the time we spend on testing, how test results best can help to improve instruction, and whether test preparation activities are crowding out more effective uses of classroom time." In Leicester, we strive to make sure that our testing schedule is efficient and causes minimal disruption to classroom instruction.

The results of these assessments are analyzed as one source of data as we work to support parts of our curriculum that are effective and determine where instruction needs to be strengthened. We plan instruction using the standards which (Continued in right column)

tell us what our students should know and be able to do at a particular grade level or in a particular content area. Standards guide our work, but these assessments give us valuable information so we can take stock of how we are doing.

This year the Middle School is devoting all of its teacher professional development time to Engaging Schools, a program that helps

schools develop a positive approach to school discipline.

Engaging Schools advocates a shift in thinking regarding school discipline, away from traditional punitive practices towards restorative practices. Current educational research shows that traditional disciplinary actions don't really work—or at least, they don't *teach*. They may result in short-term changes, but in reality they promote compliance and little else. By contrast, restorative practices are interwoven into every interaction in the building.

What is a restorative practice?

In an article entitled "Restorative practice in schools," Alison Williams describes restorative practice as a method that:

- Emphasizes relationships rather than retribution
- Builds empathy and promotes accountability, responsibility and reintegration
- Recognizes behavior as an opportunity for learning, not punishment (although there are consequences)
- Improves a classroom or school climate by providing a way for everyone to change behavior
- Moves people away from negative and blaming attitudes toward wanting to make things right.
- Determines what has/is happening, how people have been/are being impacted, and what needs to happen to make things better
- Gives everyone a voice

What is the effect of restorative practices?

The International Institute for Restorative Practices indicates that the implementation of restorative practices can result in:

Significant decreases in detention and suspension rates

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- Less classroom disruption
- Greater respect shown for teachers and classmates
- Increased feelings of safety and confidence among students
- Improved student test scores and academic performance
- Greater emphasis on teaching and learning
- Improved school community spirit

At the last professional development workshop, teachers learned how to implement 10 restorative practices ranging from simple check-ins with students and bullying/harassment conferences, all the way to suspension reentry. These are a few of the strategies that were introduced:

Personal, Academic, Behavioral Check-Ins - An adult engages one or two conflicting students in brief one-to-one check-ins:

Academic Questions - What are you working on? What are you going to do next?

Restorative Questions - What happened? What was your role in what happened? Who else was affected by this?

Morning Meetings/Class Circle - The teacher facilitates informal circles to build community and trust, share differing perspectives, and engage in problem solving.

Dialogue Circle - An adult facilitates a circle with a group of students who are gathered to reflect and discuss serious concerns, issues, or incidents.

Student/Student Mediation - With adult supervision, student co-mediators facilitate mediation between two students or a group of students who have engaged in a verbal or physical conflict.

Problem Solving and Planning Conference - An adult engages the student(s) in a conference when unproductive and ineffective behaviors, habits, or mindsets are impeding academic success.

Some of these practices take a lot of time and preparation, while others are simple and can be done quickly. The situation dictates which strategy will be chosen. When used consistently and effectively, strong relationships can be formed, helping to minimize interruptions, while strengthening teaching and learning.



Founded by former Governor Deval Patrick in 2011, Project 351 is a youth service organization dedicated to building unity and leadership among 8th graders across the state. Participants are

selected by hometown educators based on their exemplary ethic of service and their values of kindness, compassion, humility, and generosity of spirit. As ambassadors of Project 351, students make a yearlong commitment to changing the world through community service.



To become an ambassador, educators nominate and select a "quiet leader and unsung hero."
Ambassadors are diverse in all ways but share a common passion

for making a positive difference in their community and the world. With that as the criteria, it was very easy to select Delaney Sherman as this year's ambassador.

On MLK Day, a national day of community service, Delaney and all of the other ambassadors attended a "launch day" at Faneuil Hall in Boston where Governor Charlie Baker welcomed the students and talked about his own journey into public service. The governor indicated that his big brother

served as a role model, helping him to gain the confidence needed to get involved in his community.



After the welcome ceremony, all of the

ambassadors helped out at the Greater Boston Food Bank by serving more than 26,000 meals!

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As part of her year of service, Delaney will be conducting a clothing drive in conjunction with Cradles to Crayons. This

While safety issues are always addressed immediately and regular maintenance is a high priority, a facilities study of all four school buildings revealed that much of the infrastructure of the Middle School has long passed its life expectancy.

As a result, a building committee made up of school and other town administrators, teachers, parents, and townspeople has been formed to study the options, either a building renovation or replacement. To help guide the committee's decisions, it is extremely important to get feedback from the entire community.
